College Strength

The College has the optimum student admission B. Ed. courses 199 in respect of intake of 200. Drop out rate is NIL.

Admission

The admission of the students was carried out by a duly constituted 'Admission Committee'. The Selection was purely on merit basis of PTET held by the University and in accordance with the guidelines of the Government of Government of Rajasthan.

University Results

The performance of our students in the University Examinations is consistently well. The number of graduates passing through the portals of the College, records a steady increase. First round of Practice teaching started from 03.01.2014 to 29.01.2014 in 11 nearby schools permitted by the DEO. Students prepare their lesson plan in concern subject under the supervision of Subject Teacher and deliver it into real class environment of Practice Teaching Schools. Head and Staff of the Practice Teaching School observe the Lesson Plan & transaction added their valuable suggestion to the students. Second Round of Practice teaching started from 03.02.2014 to 28.02.2014. Each Pupil Teacher Deliver 40 Lessons in two teaching subjects.

Internal Examination

As per prescribed by the University, Internal examination for the pre-preparation of final Examination were held from 01.04.2014 to 22.04.2014. As per the performance of students, remedial classes were introduced by the concern staff members.

Block Teaching

For the real management of school activities and role of a Teacher 7 Days Block teaching is started from 21.04.2014 to 28.04.2014 in Practice Teaching schools. In which all the functions and activities of a school is carried by the Pupil teacher for smooth running of a Educational Institution. Pupil teacher completed their action Research during this Session. Various awareness rallies also organized in the villages during Block Teaching session.
